CONCENTRATES

One blustery fall morning in September of 1938, a group of energetic young enthusiasts descended from the hills to begin work in one of the oldest mines in the country, "The Old Red Brick Schoolhouse." We started to work on a small vein of intelligence, which, we hoped, would develop into a far wider vein and lead us to the nuggets of knowledge. The crew started with thirty six members, but only four of the original group are still with us. They are Joseph Kamby, Lillian Cole, Jack Vieweg, and Burt Bell.

Under the foremanship of Miss Marguerite Lackner, the crew learned how to use a few simple tools and worked through quantities of clay and chalk.

At the end of the first nine months we were ready to start work on the second level with the help and guidance of Miss Margaret Carlson. We hammered away on the ever-widening vein with only a few additional tools until the spring of 1939. That year we were joined by Alvena Hood who is now going to Colorado Women's College. The next strata, that of multiplication, spelling, history, and geography were tackled in the fall of 1939, under the direction of Miss Pearl Ford. Here another new member was added--Paul Giles, The Remarkable Redhead.

The shift boss of level number four was Miss Vivian Tippet. We encountered wells of ink to splash through at that depth; and we had to give a more detailed accounting of the time and tools we used than we ever had before. "Drill, drill, drill," was the order we received every hour of the day.

On level number five we encountered our new supervisor, Miss Marianne Lamberty. She handed us new and more complicated tools and we widened the vein of knowledge considerably. We scooped up buckets of information and supervisors tested frequently. The country was deep in World War II, and we spent many of our leisure hours collecting scrap iron. Richard Axelson joined the group during that year.

We reached the sixth level by September, 1945, and Mrs. Mabel Andrews took command. We tunneled through walls of books and we explored the possibilities of many side veins and feeders. Some of the miners, by this time, were ready to give up the search for the junction of the veins of education, but Mrs. Andrews kept a firm hand on her crew, and we proceeded with few casualties.



Then came the miners' first cross-cut in hard rock. We tunneled through to a new mine called "Junior High School." We were directed by the capable hand of Superintendent Maynard Bemis. That year was one of the most important years in our training and one of the most exciting. Carolyn Turner joined us late in the spring.

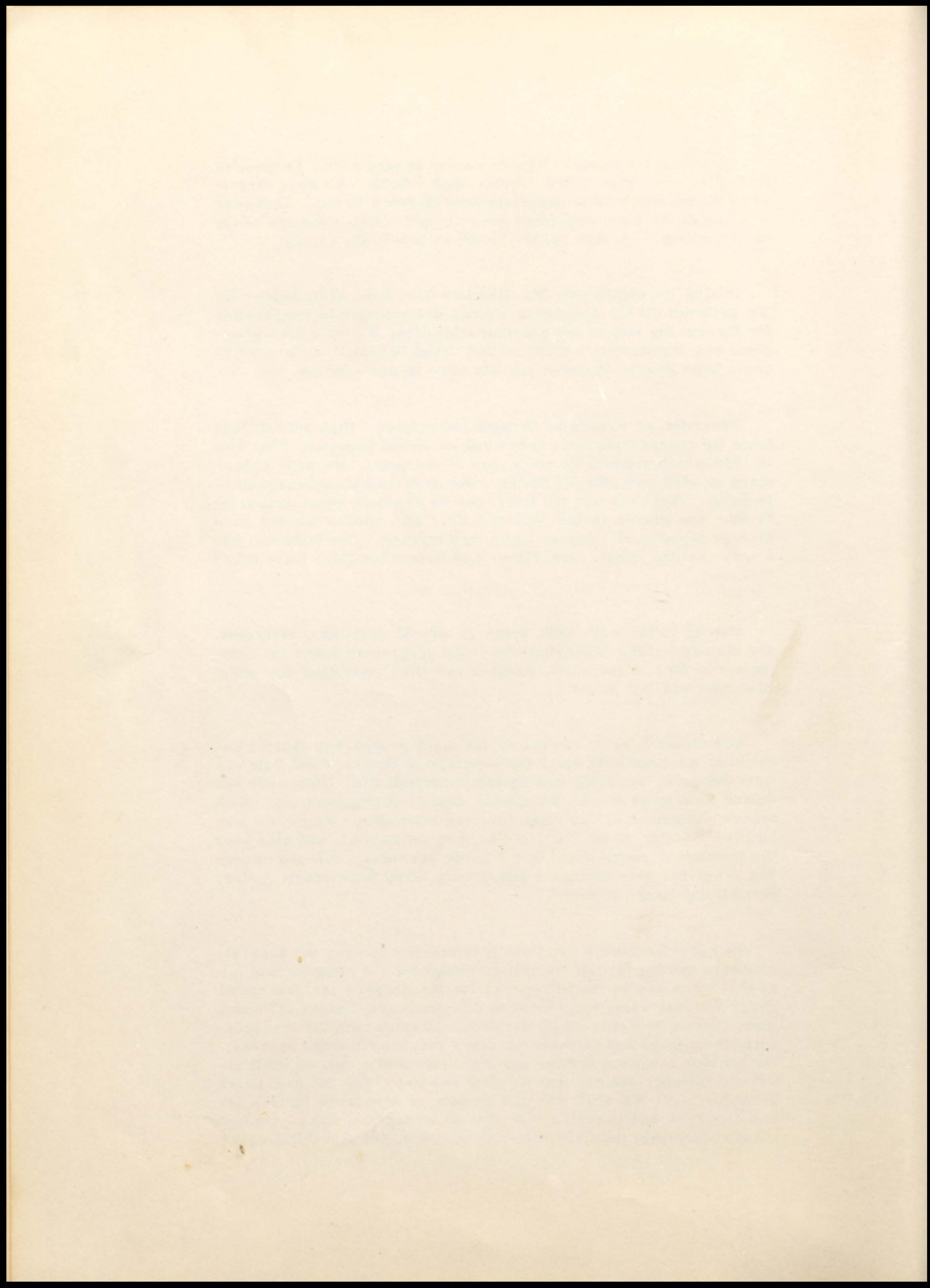
During the eighth year Mr. Bemis's firm hand again guided us. We gathered all the knowledge we had accumulated in preparation for the next big step in our quest for education. We were soon to explore new territory in a claim called "High School." Arlene Payne came from Beaver Brook to join the crew in this venture.

Fearfully, we dynamited through and entered "High School," but found the course from there not as bad as we had expected. That was in 1946, which marked the ninth year of our quest. We were supervised by shift boss, Mr. Ed Smith, under Superintendent George Kellenbenz. That year was the first year we began to stope, preparing to take our places in the Mill of Life. The miners worked hard through deposits of algebra, Latin, and science. Our initiation was a very exciting affair. Ann Stover and Helene McGuire were added that year.

Stoping in the tenth year required use of equations, theorems, and history, but the miners enjoyed it and progressed under the guiding eye of Mrs. Fred Cole. Another new man was added that year. His name was Bob Peart.

Our eleventh year was one of the most prosperous that we had yet had. We were still under the supervision of Mrs. Fred Cole and were powering our drills and equipment atomically. That work required knowledge of both the atomic chart and trigonometry. With atomic equipment we had more time for relaxation. We gave a play entitled "Junior Miss," which was very successful, and also gave the traditional junior prom that was the best affair that the miners had yet given. New members added were Mary Schoonover, Audrey Meisel, and Kenny Medford.

We spent the twelfth and final year before choosing our separate claims in milling through all the knowledge we had attained thus far, so that we would be well-prepared for the dangers that lay ahead. Peggy Forshee came from Ironton, Missouri, and Tommy O'Donnell, from Tuscon, Arizona, to join our crew. Miss Dorothy Carlson sponsored the miners and directed our class play to a climactic success. We are now prepared to mine our separate claims, but we shall always remember the day that we first entered "The Old Red Brick Schoolhouse." We shall use our nuggets of wisdom to further our own progress and to enrich that of those around us. May good luck always accompany the class of the half-century, The 1950 Goldiggers.
