History

In the fall of 1939, Idaho Springs opened the doors of its education factory to begin production of a pupil atomic pile. The board and teachers little realized the difficulties that they would encounter in such an undertaking. Upon introduction of the magnetic force, Miss Marguerite Lackner, the twelve year process was begun. To begin with there were 59 active young elements in the betatron, but down through the years some of them were blasted out by constant bombardment of protons of education and were widely scattered. The isotope atom of Arlan Michaelis was hurled into our growing atomic pile from Estes Park, Colorado, as we were increasingly projected.

Miss Lydia Gross pulled us through the beating during the sixth betatron, and knocked off some of the frictional points that tended to slow us down. That was our last experience in the old machine, for the next year we were placed in front of the speeding educational protons and neutrons of the new cyclotron in the High School Plant.



History

All of us atoms were very active in the new machine at first, but after a few days in the new and more powerful betatron, we began to slow down. Barbara Richardson from Pine, Colorado; Dean White, from Imogene, Iowa; and Jim Nunn from Hapeville, Georgia, were added. Miss Joyce Tatal was the magnetic force which pulled us through the hammering blows of the first year of our more advanced education. Miss Louise Scheerer added her weight in the second year to guide us through the big whirl of the eighth cyclotron.

After two years in these betatrons, we entered a new and more powerful one in the High School plant. At that time we added four new atoms: Nelson Bakken, from Empire; Nancee Hull, from Lincoln, Nebraska; Bert Cross was drawn back into the I. S.H.S. betatron, from Central City; Audrey Moore and Donna Osborn, from Dumont. We added a new and very powerful magnetic force, Mr. Verner Rowland, to guide us through the next four years of time.

Because of this new magnatron, we won float contests for the next two years and put on a bang-up return party.

We were enlarged in the tenth year by the addition of three new elements, Jim Fox, from Denver; Melvin Johnson, from Elyria, Ohio; and Elaine Mullenax, from Cheraw, Colorado. Our Christmas party was the successfully conducted explosion of magnificence that year.

During our eleven years of bombardment, our speed had increased until we had such very powerful and enduring atoms that one of our former atoms, lost in the sixth grade, was attracted back to our betatron from Tuscon, Arizona. This was Emmet O'Donnell. Our next great release of energy was the junior play, "We Shook The Family Tree," which left the town completely void of expression. On May 12, 1950 our surplus energy promoted the finest of Junior-Senior Proms.

We started the final stretch with the addition of only one new element, Ray Toomer, who came from Canon City, Colorado. Now, with twelve years of attraction and propulsion completed, this fused mass of atoms, compounded into terrific force, is prepared to leave the magnatron and to be hurled into the seething stream of life.
