The more we learn, the more we grow, and then the more we see,




Eyes the skies



THE BERLIN WALL


On November 9, 1989, East Germany lifted restrictions on emigration and travel West, and within hours thousands of Germans celebrated on and around the Berlin Wall

The Berlin Wall, which has divided East and West Germany since 1961, has finally begun to crumble.












ANYTHING COES



In 1948, CCSS, didn't exist. All the upper grade levels of school went to the school now known as Carlson Elementary. The graduating class of 1948 consisted of 21 people. They had one football team, a basketball team, a ski team, a Spanish club, a pep club, and 4 cheerleaders. They even had class parents; quite a difference to CCSS today.

Once upon a time, Clear Creek started a school district. Lots of things have happened since then. For one thing, the World has gotten seriously wild with the birth of our generation. I mean after all, where would this world be without us? It wouldn't be able to survive without us. Or would it?



In 1961, there was a sharp increase in the number of graduates; 41. They now had a chess club. Other than that , not much had changed since 1959.

Then we jump to 1967. There was still a small number of graduating seniors, only 48 all together. There was a great addition to clubs and sports though.





In 1979, there had been a sharp increase in available sports since previous years. They also had a yearbook staff that made their deadlines. Would we like to trade places with any of these classes?



In 1954, the graduating class They had some numbered 22. adjustments; another basketball team. band and chorus, Echo staff, Spanish club, and even two plays put on by the Junior class. There were even Homecoming events on October 21, Idaho Springs played Castle Rock and lost by 2 points. During that year, the school board decided that the school was unsafe and the students were moved to other quarters for awhile.

In 1959, the graduating class dropped to 13 in number. There was now a wrestling team. There was also a Library club, a projectionist club, a Latin club, and a G.A.A.(Girls Athletic Auxiliary??). Well life was becoming more civilized, but they still had 31 more years to go.



In 1974, around the time this crazy generation was born, people were set towards peace and freedom for the black people. They also tended to be set toward male chauvinism. They even had teachers Fraley, Bennett, Klieforth, Dickenson, Halberg, Resanovich, Gould and Weiss we have today, but many of these teachers did not teach the same subjects as they do today.

"Who? Oh, that's War--, no, that's Dri-- geez, I don't remember, give me that book."


