Reid attended Evergreen High School as a freshman, but "decided that Clear Creek was a better fit after my mom started working there."

Clear Creek High was a good fit. She will finish her senior year ranked in the top ten of her class with a 4.1 grade point average.

'Passionate about Theater'

The school also provided opportunities for her to perform: acting, singing, dancing, and choreographing. In addition to performing at CCHS, she participated in programs through the Denver Center of Performing Arts Teen Company.

"I've been performing for

14 years," she admitted. "I'm passionate about theater."

Thus, her decision to study theater arts at the University of Northern Colorado should come as no surprise.

Nor should anyone be surprised she also wants to have an emphasis in K-12 education, which will help her nurture interests in the performing arts in future generations.

"I would like to teach at a rural high school where theater isn't prominent," she said, "and push the program onto its feet."

As a sophomore, she took online courses through Brigham Young University in addition to a full course load at CCHS. That coursework

Comfortable with a Camera

Sam Lewis started attending some classes at Warren Tech as a junior and found his calling in television and video production.

"I have a little rough past," he said, "but each year I grow more and more as a person."

That self-assessment was echoed by a trio of educators who submitted letters of recommendation on his behalf.

"He grasps concepts very quickly, often needing little intervention," according to Math Teacher Calvin Berg. "He typically prefers to work alone yet has no issue teaming up with other students and helping them with any struggles."

Frances Johnson, a teacher as Warren Tech, noted that Lewis has found a place behind a camera.

Lewis recalled his first experience behind a camera, filming a play at Dakota Ridge High School. The final video didn't measure up to his standards, he said, "but I learned that I should have taken more time with setting everything up."

One of the ideas he wants to develop is film a battle with a 360-degree camera to provide an immersive experience to viewers.

"It would be a cooler, more engaging way of telling history to students."

Eventually, Lewis anticipates a career in the film industry.

Schuessler Named 2A Athletic Director of the Year

David Schuessler '83, Clear Creek High School's athletic director, was selected as the 2A Athletic Director of the Year by the Colorado Athletic Directors Association (CADA).

"I see it as a community award," he said.

Schuessler has served at Clear Creek's athletic director for 14 years and he credits his success to his team.

"There's a lot of support staff at Clear Creek that make things run well," he said. "We make a good team and together we do a good job of supporting high school athletics." He taught mathematics at CCHS for several years and coached a trio of varsity sports before finding an opportunity

to use his Master's degree. He earned a Master's in Sports Aministration from Springfield College (MA) in 1989.

Schuessler said he strives to get out of his office and interact with students.

"As an AD you need to find a way to get that interaction," he said.




Thirty Members of CCSS Class of 1970 Ready to Celebrate its 50-Year Reunion

Wattenberg Enjoys Working on his Railroad



Wattenberg, who lives in Blue Valley Acres, has created a logging and mining train layout in HOn3 narrow gauge.

HO Gauge is 1:86 or 1:87 of the real standard gauge rolling stock, equipment, buildings, and other accessories. HOn3 represents the same scaling, but for narrow gauge systems.

Within HOn3, Wattenberg has focused on the steam era of the 1930s and 1940s.

He started his modelrailroading pursuits with


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

Alumni Profile: Michele Blicharz, Lifelong Protector, Loves Motherhood, Baking Cakes

Her enjoyment of baking and decorating cakes all started when she was in the single digits and hanging around her grandparents Eleanor Delrosa, and Helen and George Blicharz.

"After school I'd go to my grandma's and she'd have all the ingredients set out," said **Michele Blicharz '86**. "I've always enjoyed baking, but I can't cook worth a hoot."

Blicharz, who now lives in Arvada, battled meningitis as a child. As a five-year-old, she endured daily spinal taps at Children's Hospital and missed so much school that she was held back one year.

The meningitis also had physical consequences; it impacted her memory enough that she needed extra help in school.

She struggled to overcome such judgement from teachers and peers, but hid her perceived shortcomings with a strong personality, serving as Dusty the Golddigger in middle school, and cheerleading throughout high school.

She also went out of her way to be friends with other students unfairly judged by others.

"I stood up for those kids

like me," she said. "I raised my kids to accept everyone. I think God used me to be a protector."

She needed her own protector when she slammed her orange VW bug into a soda machine at the Standard Gas Station in Idaho Springs. Her riders and classmates thought the crash, which resulted from an oily shoe sole sliding off the brake pedal, was hilarious. She was mortified, she recalled.

After graduating from CCSS, she married **Blake Evans '86**. He joined the Air Force and they moved to Mississippi where they welcomed son Zach. They moved to Utah and welcomed son Dustin. They welcomed daughter Tanya after returning to Colorado.

"All I wanted to do was to be a mother," she said. "It was the best job ever."

Now divorced, Blicharz is enjoying life as a mother, grandmother, and entrepreneur. And she has renewed her interest in crafting cakes.

Ultimately, returning to this pursuit was only a matter of time for the woman who earned her only A+ in an art class taught by Virginia Unseld.

"She was my favorite teacher. I loved my art."

Blicharz owns and operates Cakes by ME, a company whose name reflects her married name: Michele Evans. Although she had several clients in Texas when she lived there, she's had a harder time developing clients in the Denver area since returning to Colorado in 2019.

Blicharz appreciates the roots she shares with all of us.

"It was a true blessing going to Clear Creek."

A Semester Studying in Uganda Changed the Career Path for Halley (Goymerac) Jones

When my community, state, nation, or (in this case) planet is in crisis, I recall the advice from Fred Rogers (of Mister Rogers' Neighborhood) to "look for the helpers."

Halley (Goymerac) Jones '04 is such a helper.

After graduating from high school, she enrolled at Colorado State University and started earning her degree in International Studies. During her final semester, she studied abroad in Uganda.

"I planned on doing international aid work," she said, "and I thought my dream job would be to work with the United Nations."

When she was in Uganda, she discovered that funds from most non-profits or nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) didn't seem to benefit the people in greatest need or efficiently.

"The projects by local people seemed much more effective than those of outsiders coming in to make a difference, and I didn't see how I could fit in to that world."

She decided to volunteer at a refugee camp with the Red Cross.

"I really enjoyed how the Red Cross worked to provide

relief during a crisis. That made sense to me."

In the last semester of her undergraduate career, she did some soul-searching and changed plans.

"Some of the most important things to me were traveling, helping others, and I loved working with and being around people with disabilities. So, I started nursing school!"

She earned her bachelor's degree in nursing from Regis University.

Inspired by Her Patients

She lives in Baltimore, Maryland, and works in a Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU).

"I like that I get to help Page 14 people in some of the hardest times of their lives," she said. "In my unit, I'm part of a team giving babies a chance at life they wouldn't have outside of the hospital. I like the challenges (sometimes), and I like that my work matters."

She said her patients inspire her to be the best because their lives literally depend on her best.

She would like nurses to have a greater voice in healthcare because "at times, and by different people, we are underrated or undervalued."

She also believes higher wages and hazard pay during pandemics and other critical times would improve the field and, as a result, patient outcomes.

"It's a great career if you have compassion for others, and you want to work hard at a job that matters."

For others interested in nursing, she recommends shadowing a nurse and investigating the multiple fields in which nurses work.

"At times, it can be the hardest job you'll ever have. It can also be incredibly rewarding."

Ever-changing Computer Technology, Aging Fords Capture the Interest of Bud Orr '61

After graduating from Idaho Springs High School in 1961, **Bud Orr** attended the University of Colorado in Boulder and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in business.

He emerged from college into a nation starting to dabble in computers.


"The computer software and application field in 1966 was a ground floor opportunity," he said. "I was fortunate to start working in the profession."

At the time, taking a job in that nascent field was a risk, but that's the advice he offers to future alumni: "Don't hesitate to take risks."

Ultimately, he worked in Information Technology in both analyst and manager roles for 40 years. He retired in 2006.

His first job was in California, but he returned to Colorado as soon as he could. He said the field was exciting because the technology changed so rapidly and because he was constantly learning. He also traveled across the nation and had responsibility for a computer installation project in Germany.

He credits his parents for

"My mom and dad set high expectations for me," he said. "They gave me a wonderful upbringing."

As for people who currently inspire him, Orr said Barack Obama and Bill Gates are among his heroes now.

Orr, who was a long-time board member of the CCHS

"I also restore old Ford cars," he said, "a teenage passion that I've never outgrown."
