
A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT



Bill Yeager leaves the drug store and Polly to the boys in '43. But he'll be back after Polly in May.




THE REDSKIN CLASS


8th Grade

THE INTERCLASS TOURNAMENTS





On land, in the air, and on the sea, all to victory are thousands of America's young men, and several of whom have gone to our idaho Springs elementary and high school.




In the Air? a few from here have joined the air corps and they are to be deeply admired for offering a service so necessary, yet, so dangerous.


On the shores of Tripoli are many handsome Idaho Springs boys who were ready, willing and able to pass the difficult tests of the United States Marines.
