In our Junior year, we presented the comedy, "Dear Ruth," for our class play, and it was a huge success. The Junior Prom and Banquet was held April 24, 1948, at the Radium Hot Springs Hotel. The theme was "In An Old Dutch Garden."

Despite the deep snows which hounded all our activities, they were very merry occasions. Lefty Yost, Ray Troxel, and Justin Verhoeff joined us that year. Our helping hand came from Mrs. Vida Cannady.

Our roll recently added Charles Mullenax, Marjorie Johnson, and Mae Dee Shackelton. Our annual, in our opinion, will be the best ever put out, a credit to the school. We anticipate that our play will be a successful endeavor. Instead of the senior reception we are planning a barbeque for the juniors. The juniors have scheduled the usual prom in our honor.
