For seniors, the year was full of excitement, emotions, and expenses. Every year the graduating class must pay for various items; both from the activity fund for the senior class and from their personal funds. Among these items to be paid for from the activity fund are flowers for parents, gifts for sponsors, and decorations for Baccalaureate. The activity fund begins and increases yearly since seniors were freshmen. If the funds are depleted, each student is asked to give a donation of $\$ 5$ to
cover additional costs. Seniors are also expected to pay for cap and gown rental which in the past has been an average of $\$ 12.50$ per person. Finally, a decision must be made regarding graduation announcements and senior portraits. Seniors are not required to buy these items, but if they are purchased, the cost of the announcements can range from $\$ 75$ to $\$ 300$. The portraits can range from \$100 to $\$ 300$. Not only is it expensive to be in high school, but to finish those years is expensive also.

(above)At the beginning of the year, if anyone mentioned the name Anita Hill, the common response was,"Anita who?" But, as the year pressed on, and President Bush nominated Clarence Thomas to the Supreme Court most everyone knew of the professor from Oklahoma. Among sexual harassment charges and three days of riveting testimony from both sides ensued. In the end, Thomas was confirmed 52-48, the

second closest vote in history. The testimony brought severe criticism upon the confirmation process.
(right) Probably the biggest story of the school year was the attempted (but failed) coup that began in the Soviet Union on August 19 under allegations of Gorbechev being unable to perform his duties because of illness. This turned out to be untrue.


(left) Another top story covered was the civil war in Yugoslavia. The war unraveled the nation of six divergent republics, two of which-Croatia and Slovenia-declared independence from the Federation in June,1991. We paid attention because our school had hosted a student from Yugoslavia last year.
(below) August 21, the leaders of the coup were reported to have fled Moscow. Tanks and armored personnel carriers moved away from Russian Parliment and the leaders of the national legsilature demanded Gorbechev be returned to power.

Other stories that topped the news included, Secretary of State, James Baker made several trips on behalf of President Bush. His main priority was a peace conference in the Middle East.

South African President F.W. De Klerk loosened his tough stand on apartheid, causing President Bush to lift some sanctions.

The Group of Seven industrial democracies (known as G-7) held an economic summit that dealt with a wide range of issues -- from world economic policy to building world partnership to international trade. Leaders of the G-7 economic summit gathered at the Tower of London.

Many other stories made the news but these are those which we will never forget.
